Weather Considerations

Winter is here! Remember weather fluctuations and extreme temperatures can put our pets at risk for illness, injury and exposure to the elements.

To keep your pet safe this winter below are some good reminders:

- · Limit outdoor exposure accordingly
- Carefully monitor outdoor playtime during extreme weather to avoid frostbite or hypothermia
- · Use coats and boots for pets that do not have thick coats
- Check paws for ice build-up or bleeding
- Keep furry paws trimmed to limit snowball build-up
- During icy conditions, limit running and trim nails to avoid breakage
- · Wipe paws and stomach to reduce build up from chemicals such as ice melt
- Use pet safe ice melt products

Are You Aware of Design & Development Plans for the Park?

Although the process began in 2007 and plans passed in 2011, the majority of park users have little or no idea about any of the plans for River Park, Sandy Beach and the Britannia Escarpment.

According to The City's website, here's a chronological list of what transpired:

- In 2007 The City received concerns about overuse/deterioration; maintenance/long-term planning was requested to manage/reduce user conflicts
- In 2008 Parks hired O2 Planning + Design to develop a management and development plan
- A planning process was launched in Fall 2008 until Spring 2011
- 2009 public engagement consisted of two stake holder workshops (Jan 29 & July 16), an online survey (July/Aug) and a public open house (Sept 29)
- 2011 public engagement consisted of two info sessions (Jan 19 & 27), one open space workshop (Feb 12), a world cafe workshop (March 19), two rounds of moderated online dialogue (March 1-17 and April 4-15), online public review (May 10-20) and a public open house (May 14)

The City stated in an Calgary Herald article that \$8.3 million had to be found in order to proceed with design, management and development.

When the 2013 flood occurred, it was widely thought all development would be delayed. However in 2014, the Sandy Beach bridge reconstruction was completed and fences were erected in Sandy Beach and River Park.

Residents and people who use Sandy Beach and the Britannia side were so unhappy with the reduction of space, the fences and small doggie area, they started petitions and protested during the re-opening of the Sandy Beach bridge in Fall 2014.

Meanwhile, River Park users quietly accepted the fence erected at the north end even though it's well known around the park that no one likes the fence. Most people have no idea there are plans to erect two more fences just like it and they will also stretch from east to west. Approximate locations appear to be just north of the slough (near the parking lot) and the other looks like it will be close to the fountain. Their logic is to use the fences to close areas of the park and allow the terrain to rejuevenate.

Many longtime users just prefer more aerating, watering and mowing as is done in the south end of the park rather than corralling users into smaller areas. Compacting use will certainly be hard on the terrain. Again, many longtimers know the irrigation system in the north end of the park hasn't been used in decades. Perhaps money can be spent to augment the irrigation system and maintenance budget rather than erect fences. Aerial maps of River Park show a distinct difference in the north and south ends. It's good to consider that just a little more TLC can be the solution. Maybe it's just a matter of convincing decision-makers.

More development will likely occur in Spring/Summer this year. If you don't want to see proposed plans proceed, you must become informed and get involved. Make your voice heard by contacting your alderman or list your concern through 3-1-1.
