Reader's Comments Regarding Bad Off-leash Experiences

For the most part, we typically hear River Park is one of the best off-leash areas for people and dogs. Unfortunately not everyone has had a great experience. Dana recently wrote to express some concerns and ask for support, acknowledgment and understanding from fellow park users.

"I miss the culture in River Park that I first encountered 15 years ago. I am writing to you out of frustration and a need to vent after witnessing a big dog attack a little dog at River Park.

A Husky ran up and grabbed a little dog by the neck and shook it. The Husky and it's owner were hanging out like nothing was wrong. The woman with the Husky said it wasn't her dog; she said she was just walking it and couldn't really control it. The little dog, a chihuahua, was not bleeding and walking okay but it screamed when its owner tried to pick it up. I sure hope it's ok.

This behavior infuriates me!

I have 2 small dogs that I have stopped bringing to the park because of numerous attempted attacks on them. This saddens me because they do love the park as much as big dogs.

I did not retreat when the attacks happened. I confronted the owners. Some were genuinely upset at their dog's behavior, others just ignored the incident and my comments. I've actually had a few tell me that I shouldn't bring my little dogs to a "BIG DOG" park. When people say, "It's not my dog, I'm just walking it." THIS IS NO EXCUSE! It's not responsible.

Pouncing and shaking are a dog's hunting tactics. Many people think it's cute and they're just playing. Yes, it's cute sometimes. But it's not ok for dogs to practice their hunting skills on other dogs at the park.

I've struggled with a dog's training too. There are good days and bad days. I see many people going through the same thing. I've also encountered many people who are failing at being responsible, considerate dog owners. I want to set an example by calling out the irresponsible dog owners and making it an uncomfortable place for them to be and they won't attend anymore. The park will be a better place."

Thanks to Dana for her comments. The bottom line is:

- Everyone and every dog is welcome at the park.
- · Dogs need to be in control at all times.
- Respect and responsibility ensures a great experience for all.
