Dog Behaviour

No it's NOT okay! Just because your dog is friendly doesn't mean all dogs are - please remember:

Never let your dog run up to a dog on leash- they could be scared or become reactive.

Try to respect other owners and their need for space.

Not all dogs want the added attention or intrusion.

Weed Killer Use and Dogs

Do you think about herbicide use and the potential of harm to our dogs? You may not spray your yard, but dangers may be as close as your neighbour's lawn or a nearby green space. Read this article to learn if residuals pose a danger. Thanks to Robin M for sharing with our readers.

Just a cautionary note related to herbicide use in Calgary. Signs are often posted in the neighbourhood by The City of Calgary to warn people about spraying herbicides in public spaces such as parks.

The City of Calgary can only advertise on city-owned spaces. A posted sign doesn't necessarily mean the area itself was sprayed, however be aware that spraying has occurred somewhere nearby.

Large white A-frame signs typically contain a sample of the 14" x 12" yellow signs that indicate details such as dates and the type of product used.

Many of us have concerns for the well-being of people and animals and worry about the herbicide being ingested through breathing or absorbed through skin. With the dogs and children being lower to the ground it's even more reason to be vigilant.

So far, no one has reported any sign sightings this year, but it's good to be mindful. To safeguard the health of you and your dog, keep your eyes peeled for signs and read content carefully. Use your nose (the smell is quite strong so it's a dead give-away) and steer clear of sprayed areas.



Green Initiatives

Scooping droppings is probably the most unpleasant tasks we all face as dog caregivers. Yes we all have to do it so let's consider some ideas for making the task more pleasant while helping the environment too.

Green Cart Program

Many residents have received their green carts as part of The City of Calgary's composting initiative.



Did you know pet waste is a perfectly acceptable item to deposit? For many of us with dogs that use the yard as their bathroom, we can scoop the yard and place the

poop inside the green cart. While some of us will continue to use a bag, keep in mind the bag can't be thrown in the cart. Perhaps you may consider going one step further to help the environment by skipping bags all together and use a shovel or large scoop to collect droppings. There are also many pooper scooper gadgets available for sale such as a spade/tray, rake/tray or spring-loaded jaw styles designed to make the task easier.

Other pet-related items that are also acceptable in green carts are fur, kitty litter, pet food and treats.
