While some people intentionally ignore their responsibility to clean up after their dog, most times it's just a matter of inattentiveness such as people chatting to others, looking the other way momentarily or watching dogs play. This winter, people were likely watching their footing. Whatever the case, the poop still needs to be picked up!

Some of us stoop and scoop after others and say nothing; others struggle finding something less accusatory to say than, "Hey, need a bag?" For sure it's not always easy to approach this subject.



In my experience picking up at the park for many years, I like to give people the benefit of the doubt. Comments are better received if they're neutral and well-intentioned.

So here are some great ideas to help spin a pick-up line with fellow dog people at the park:

"Pardon me. Is that your dog having a poop?" "Oh my, I believe your dog is leaving a mess behind." "Looks like your dog is depositing a load over there." "May I bring to your attention... your dog is pooping." "Oh look... I think that's your dog having a dump." "Hi there. Looks like you're on clean-up doo-ty." "I believe it's your turn to pick up."

"Attention please... Clean up on trail two!"


