Taking Care of the River Park Fountain

A few days before the May long weekend, Lynn M and Kate C from the Friends of River Park Leadership Team kindly uncovered the fountain. cleaned it up and gave it a fresh coat of paint. Their timing was perfect as it coincided with water service resuming.



Each year since its installation in 2007, the water fountain is one of the features that draws people and dogs from all over the city to River Park. Indeed how lucky we are to have one.

The fountain is part of a memorial site that is the legacy of a young woman with an extraordinary love and compassion for all animals. Cathryn "Cat" Margetts was the proud and successful proprietor of Barking Mad Dog Service. She had an exceptional rapport with all creatures, and her "customers" adored her.

On May 25, 2004, Cat lost her life while trying to rescue the dogs and cats trapped inside her burning home. During a final rescue attempt, her beloved German Shepherd, Adami followed her back into the blazing house. Cat succumbed to smoke inhalation with Adami at her side, and Max T Moose in her arms.

Family, friends and the community joined forces to create a lasting tribute to this courageous woman, who will be remembered as a loving daughter, sister, and friend.

The current fountain is the third we've had since 2007. The first fountain was stone but could not stand up to the amount of urine. The second was also stone and was vandalized beyond repair. The third and current fountain is metal and similar to other fountains in Calgary parks.

The fountain requires ongoing maintenance. Damaging rust is the result of two main reasons: dog urine and weather.

Despite the efforts of Cat's parents and our team to clear urine-saturated snow and ice during the winter and a few attentive dog owners who keep their dogs from urinating on it year-round, the fountain takes a fair amount of abuse. One day, it will need to be replaced... again. And IF we are able to get a replacement, it will be our fourth. If need be, we'll fundraise. In the meantime, please help by keeping your dog from peeing on the fountain.









Pet-friendly Alternatives to Lawn and Garden Chemicals

Warm weather means everyone has started to groom their yards and gardens. While it's easy to use pesticides, herbicides and harsh fertilizers, it means you and your pet are likely bringing them into our homes where they can be inadvertently absorbed or inhaled by us and our furry family members.

Many stores carry natural lawn and garden products but the word "natural" can be misleading. If in doubt, visit the manufacturer's website for more information and carefully evaluate details about the ingredients contained.

Here are some Do-It-Yourself natural alternatives that are safe for you and your pet, as well as the environment.

Garlic Pesticide Spray

Chop an entire bulb of peeled garlic. Place in a blender with two cups of water. Puree until smooth and refrigerate for 24 hours. Strain,

discard pulp and add three litres of fresh water. Pour mixture into a spray bottle to mist plants.

Salt and Vinegar Herbicide

Dissolve half a cup of salt into one cup of hot water, then add one cup of white vinegar. Pour into a spray bottle. During application, be careful to spray only on weeds as the salt isn't good for soil or other plants.

Signs of toxin exposure

Contact your veterinarian if you notice the following signs in your pet.

- Vomiting
- Excessive drooling
- Constricted pupils
- Diarrhea
- Lethargy
- · Increased heart rate
- · Lack of balance
- Seizures
- Muscle tremours
- · Breathing difficulty
