

Problematic Weeds

Weather conditions have been ideal for overgrown weeds on the east side of River Park again. The invasive weeds include: Crested Wheat Grass, Kentucky Blue Grass, Smooth Brome and thistle.

Long, thick weeds make it hard to find dog droppings (and at times, even the dog), and reduces the usuable space during warm weather months for all of us.

Quality of Your Dog's Output is a Health Indicator

As caregivers for our dogs, we're pretty good at knowing when they're not feeling well. Usually we notice changes in behaviour, habits and energy level or lack of appetite.

Another health measure is the consistency of their poop. It's easy to see when picking up while walking in the neighbourhood or at the off-leash park but it's also a great idea to do a daily check on the deposits in your yard. Here's a <u>great article</u> and chart from Purina to help measure output. If you find a trip to your veterinarian is necessary, this can help describe consistency.

Fecal Scoring Chart SPECIMEN EXAMPLE SCORE **CHARACTERISTICS** • Very hard and dry • Often expelled as individual pellets • Requires much effort to expel from body • Leaves no residue on groun when picked up • Firm, but not hard, pliable • Segmented in appearance • Little or no residue on ground when picked up • Log shaped, moist surface • Little or no visible segmentation • Leaves residue on ground, but holds firm when picked up • Very moist and soggy Log shaped • Leaves residue and loses form when picked up • Very moist but has a distinct shape • Present in piles rather than logs • Leaves residue on ground and loses form when picked up • Has texture, but no defined shape • Present as piles or spots • Leaves residue on ground when picked up • Watery • No texture • Present in flat puddles

Bench Renewal Update

As mentioned in the February off-leash newsletter, the 10-year lease on our two benches in recognition of River Park dogs will expire early in 2021.

Parks Foundation states the cost to renew our benches is \$3500 each + GST (the original price we paid and the cost to arrange a new bench is \$4200 + GST so they're extending "a deal").

So far, interest in renewing has been quite low. Fewer than 15 people are willing to donate. As a result of job losses and uncertainty, we estimate it will be even harder to fundraise during a pandemic.

If we proceed, we feel it's more feasible to fundraise for one bench and then ask Parks Foundation to place both existing plaques on it.

Please contact us if you want to donate to renew our lease. If there's enough interest, we'll move forward with fundraising. If there's not enough interest, I'll inform Parks Foundation that we'll decline participation.



Mosquitoes - Be Gone!



Unfortunately conditions have been perfect for high volumes of mosquitoes this year. They certainly enjoy feasting on people as well as dogs.

While many dogs have a thick coat to protect them, mosquitoes find short fur on noses is an easy access point. These pesky bugs pose risks such as heartworm, West Nile virus and allergic reactions for many dogs.

To safeguard our furry family members, keep their heartworm treatment up to date and avoid walking during peak times (dusk and dawn). Also ask your veterinarian about natural repellent products for dogs such as lemon eucalyptus oil, soybean oil, geranium oil, thyme, clove oil or neem oil. Check out this article with many natural options for dogs (including some that are homemade) suggested by Dogs Naturally Magazine.
